From Behind the Stained Glass

Each year, I try to come up with a word that needs to be the focus of that year. In the past, we have used the words: Stewardship, Evangelism, Relationship Building and Engagement. I spoke of the need for our church and its members to use their time, talents and offerings in a God-honoring and accountable way. I spoke of our need as individuals to be people who invite others to church, who tell people about Jesus. I have talked about building relationships from one-time connections to longtime friends and everywhere in between. I have written about ways in which our church can gain the attention of the world around us. The word for this year is **HUMANITY**. As a church, we must seek out ways to be human with those around us.

Humanity can be defined many different ways. Humanity is the collection of all humans. Humanity is our nature as human beings - how we act, behave, live. Humanity is our benevolent nature. Humanity is the learning or literature concerned with human culture - especially literature, history, art, music, and philosophy. So, humanity understands that we are a collection of humans living in a given area. Humanity is how we live as humans, our tendencies, skills and limitations. Humanity is treating other humans well. Humanity is the study of our works of creativity and history.

Historically, the Church has always done its best when it has worked to meet a need of its community. Christians have been the people who go where no one else has and work. Christians have cared for the sick, the lonely, the outcasts by starting hospitals, nursing homes, community centers, clinics and orphanages. Christians have cared for those who have suffered great tragedy by starting the Red Cross, the Salvation Army, and homeless shelters. Christians have cared for the future of people groups by starting schools, universities, and training centers.

All of those things still need to happen, but the Church's role in America is more for those who have fallen through the cracks. We have schools, hospitals and food banks. The Church in America is working to meet the needs that have outpaced what the free market or the government provide.

What is the major need of the community, however, that is largely going unmet? I would say it is HUMANITY. Think about it this way. Humanity is the collection of all humans. Yet, we live in a fractured society that only seems to care about its own group. Humanity is our nature as human beings. Yet, we live in a society of people who clearly don't know how to meet their own needs. Humanity is the study of our own creativity and history. Yet, as a people we are losing so much of the knowledge generations prior have taken for granted. Humanity is our benevolent nature. Yet, we default to taking care of number one.

We live in an increasingly segregated, isolated, and selfish world. Our God calls us to live in unity, with the good of the whole in mind. Here are some synonyms for humanity: compassion, brotherly love, fraternity, fellow feeling, philanthropy, humaneness, kindness, consideration, understanding, sympathy, tolerance; leniency, mercy, mercifulness, clemency, pity, tenderness, benevolence, charity, goodness, magnanimity, and generosity. Could you imagine what might happen if we as the Church can teach people the importance, the necessity of humanity?

How do we do it? Easy, by being humans ourselves. Let this be the year that we as a church and each of us individually live our lives in unity, with a benevolent heart, an understanding spirit, and an inquisitive mind.





A CALL FOR PRAYER

Throughout January there have been many requests for prayer both in our church and out. It is our duty to lift each other up and to pray for one another. That being said, I would like to share a few words from Dr. Charles Stanley:

"A small crowd gathered around Jesus before His ascension. They heard His command to spread the gospel around the globe, making disciples and baptizing people from all nations. Surely this seemed like an overwhelming task for a handful of followers, but they obeyed. Their personal experiences with Christ undoubtedly motivated them to share the good news, and they also must have gained confidence from Jesus' promise of His presence and power. We, too, should be taking Christ's command seriously. One of our highest callings as believers is to tell others about Him. Are you passionately telling others about Christ? ('Do you support those who do?')

Loving God involves not just having a personal relationship with Jesus but also sharing Him with others. The world around you needs the power of Christ. Let the Holy Spirit guide and enable you to share effectively with those around you."

It is vital that we have an active prayer life alongside devotional time with our Savior. We are called to serve, share, give thanks, and pray!

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."- 1 Thessalonians 5:16–18

We receive letters year-round from our missionaries thanking us for our support. They share their appreciation sincerely as well as express their needs. The main thing discussed is prayer! They need us to pray for them! Many are in harm's way. In many other countries, Christians are often persecuted by being jailed or even to the point of death just as the Saints before us were in the Bible. Please, please pray daily for those who are taking the message of salvation to the ends of the Earth!! I leave you with a guide:

HOW TO PRAY FOR YOUR MISSIONARIES

Pray For Open Doors: "Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains" (Colossians 4:2-3, NIV). Open doors can't be taken for granted. Many missionaries work in countries that are difficult to access or in areas that are resistant to the gospel. But "open

doors" include more than just access to nations and people groups. Individuals' hearts also need to be open and receptive to God's truth.

Pray For Boldness In Witness: "Pray also for me, that whenever I open my mouth, words may be given to me so that I will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel" (Ephesians 6:19, NIV). Missionaries are regular people who fear pain and rejection as much as anyone else. When faced with opposition, they need God's strength to help them stand firm.

Pray That God's Word Will Spread: *"Finally, dear brothers and sisters, I ask you to pray for us. Pray first that the Lord's message will spread rapidly and be honored wherever it goes...."* (2 Thessalonians 3:1, NLT) Obstacles must be removed to allow God's Word to spread rapidly and freely. Removing obstacles implies resolute resistance in spiritual warfare. Just as Aaron and Hur supported Moses' arms in the battle against the Amalekites (Exodus 17:12), you can strengthen the arms of missionaries through your prayers.

Pray For Protection: *"Pray, too, that we will be saved from wicked and evil people, for not everyone believes in the Lord"* (2Thessalonians 3:2, NLT). In some countries, open doors may expose missionaries to the possibility of danger and personal harm. Opposition to the gospel may include hatred and violence.

Pray For God's Guidance: *"So we have continued praying for you ever since we first heard about you. We ask God to give you a complete understanding of what He wants to do in your lives, and we ask Him to make you wise with spiritual wisdom"* (Colossians 1:9, NLT). Many missionaries travel frequently, both nationally and internationally. Their mode of transportation varies from country to country and often involves stressful situations.

Pray For Refreshment: "We also pray that you will be strengthened with His glorious power so that you will have all the patience and endurance you need. May you be filled with joy" (Colossians 1:11, NLT). 56 Missionaries deal with many of the same stresses you face in life such as overwhelming workloads, relational conflicts, and financial uncertainties. Often, however, missionaries struggle with these issues alone, without the fellowship and support of other Christians. Living and working cross-culturally adds an additional element that can challenge their emotional, spiritual, and physical vitality.

Partners In Prayer: The apostle Paul was a missionary and a man of prayer. He prayed for those without Christ, for the believers, and for the new churches established under his ministry. He also asked the believers to pray for him: "Dear brothers and sisters, I urge you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to join me in my struggle by praying to God for me. Do this because of your love for me, given to you by the Holy Spirit" (Romans 15:30, NLT). Paul knew prayer would bring results.
