Behind the Stained Glass

Lent is upon us. We are in the 40-day window in which all Christians are encouraged to prepare for Easter Sunday. What does that even mean? There really aren't that many preparations to make for Easter. It takes all of Advent to get ready for Christmas, but Easter only needs a few days, a week tops. At our house, we buy some candy and go into the basement for the baskets. Throw in a trip to Kohl's for some dress clothes and 10 minutes decorating eggs and we are ready for Easter. So why all 40 days? Why is it so hard that we even get to take Sundays off?

In popular culture, Lent is a time to give something up. We give up a luxury of life for a few weeks. We give up chocolate or pop; we give up caffeine or make some other kind of small sacrifice. The idea goes that Jesus sacrificed for us and in our sacrificial act we come to better understand what he has done for us. Most of the time these sacrifices even serve a double purpose. They count for Lent and make us healthier. If giving up caffeine or chocolate or pop is that hard for you, you are drinking way too much of it. So, we get to do our Christianly duty and might even lose a pound or two. That all seems pretty weak to me.

Lent is a time to give up something, but not your favorite snack or a mild addiction. Lent is a time to give up a little more control to Jesus. In Lent we are preparing to witness and accept anew the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We are preparing to witness and accept anew the Lordship of Christ. We do that by doing more of what he told us to do in our daily lives. Jesus revealed to us a lot about how he wants us to live in the Scriptures, but if I could boil it down to a few things, I would say that Jesus told us to live a life of understanding who we truly are and loving one another. We are broken people in need of a savior. God loves everyone and wants them to know the savior as well. If we can spend Lent coming to grips with who we really are... If we can spend Lent realizing that God wants us to love everyone... Then we would be ready for Easter Sunday!

Historically, Lent has been about preparing for Easter through **prayer**, **doing penance**, **repentance of sins, almsgiving, atonement, and self-denial**. **Prayer** helps us get ready for Easter when we are diligent in asking God for help. We need to spend the next 40 days asking for God to help us. Too often our prayers go un-prayed or they are only asking God to do stuff for us. Prayer for God's help admits that we can't do something on our own, but agrees to be an active part of the solution. **Penance** at its best, is doing something to make up for a wrong doing. Penance helps us get ready for Easter by showing us that we have taken an active role in wrongdoing, so we can take an active role in making it right. **Repentance** of sins helps us get ready for Easter by admitting to God that he knows best and what we are doing is keeping our relationship distant.

Almsgiving is giving to the needy. Jesus told us to share with those around us. Too often we let our money take the place of Jesus. We put our trust in our savings, we put our faith in the market, and we judge others by how much money they have. When we share our treasures, we prepare for Easter by putting our faith directly in charge of our false gods. Atonement means forgiveness. Only Jesus can forgive our sins, but we are to forgive the sins of those around us. When we forgive we say to God that Justice is in His hands and we reveal the love of God to others. Grudges only hide God's grace from those who hold them. Self-denial is denying ourselves something we have mistaken as a necessity. This isn't the same as doing without. Self-denial isn't giving up all our food, giving away all your money, living unsheltered, or giving up everything. John the Baptist says to give a cloak to those who don't have one, if you have two. Paul says don't share so that you have nothing, share so that there can be equality. Self-denial is saying that we have mistaken a luxury for a necessity; we have overestimated how much of something we need. My sinful self has told me to keep buying well past the point of need. My sinful self has told me to keep building bigger storehouses. Self-denial helps us get ready for Easter by keeping greed at bay.

The next two months I am going to be doing a sermon series about the radical preparation Lent is supposed to be. I am calling it 'Lent Out on a Limb'. The idea is that a life following Jesus is supposed to leave us feeling vulnerable. Following after Jesus is supposed to be so counter to the ways of this world that other people wonder what is wrong with us. I saw a quote once that says: 'Why not go out on a limb? That is where all the fruit is.' Safe discipleship leads to minimal reward. Discipleship that takes us out on the limb leads to amazing fruit. Join me this Lent for real, daring preparation.

From David & Joy Miller:

This duo is busy spreading the Gospel through housing and hosting international students. Here is just one of the ways they do this... "In Mainland China, Christians are discriminated against in getting education, so there are fewer of them in universities, and official Marxist doctrine is strictly materialist. As a result, most Chinese university students think of Christianity as outdated, superstitious, and "unscientific," something like ancestor worship. For this reason, they're rather struck when well-educated people in the sciences say that they're Christians. When they find out that Joy's a Christian "but" has a doctorate in chemistry and works in pharmaceuticals, they often want to talk with her to see how this strange combination can exist. So periodically we host a Chinese couple, medical doctor and chemistry PhD, to come to give lectures on "Faith and Science" at MIT in Cambridge and in Worcester (Worcester Polytechnic, Clark University, Worcester State, and University of Massachusetts Medical School). More than half of the lectures are in Mandarin."

Heartbeats connecting with incarcerated women:

A special team of trained and experienced Client Consultants are now going into the local jail on a regular basis to connect with women who may need the hope, help and healing that Heartbeats can provide while they are incarcerated. Moms can earn points through their 'Earn While You Learn' program and learn valuable information about parenting in the process! Additionally, they can work one on one with participants to help them establish and achieve personal goals and greater development in areas of concern in their life. They have been blessed to connect with 15 women who were anxiously awaiting the first session! Pray for the team and this opportunity to share the love of Jesus!

Mahon's update:



One Great Hour of Sharing has a long history of doing good work in the name of Christ. It started in 1949 as an hour-long radio appeal aimed at raising the funds necessary to provide relief and reconstruction after World War II. It has evolved over the years varying from eight to twenty-nine participating denominations and is the most participated in offering of PC(USA).

Our church has received this offering since the beginning during the Lenten Season each year. It fits well into the historical practices of fasting, giving up food or other things and devoting ourselves to prayer, study and devotion to God as we contemplate all Jesus did for us on the cross during the season of Lent.

This year, One Great Hour of sharing is calling us to consider a new kind of fast, sharing bread instead of giving it up. Isaiah 58 calls us to loose the bonds of injustice, let the oppressed go free, invite the homeless into our homes and share bread with the hungry. When we do these things, Isaiah tells us that our light will shine, and we will be known as, "repairers of the breach, restorers of streets to live in". The offering will be equally divided among the local Salvation Army, World Vision and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. It will be collected between Wednesday, March 1 and Palm Sunday, April 9, 2017.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance works alongside communities as they recover and find hope after the devastation of natural or human caused disasters both in the United States and around the world. In 2016, OGHS provided grants for church fires, floods, hurricanes, refugee ministry, tornadoes and wildfires in the USA. It provided grants to countless countries outside the USA including Haiti, South Sudan, Syria, Lebanon, Malawi and the Philippines.

Our local Salvation Army extends a hand of compassion to the hungry, homeless and forgotten people of our county. Their programs include: a homeless shelter, help with long-term housing, daily nutritious meals, rehabilitation programs, clothing, programs for children and holiday assistance.

World Vision is a Christian humanitarian organization dedicated to working with children, families and communities, regardless of race, ethnicity, religion or gender to reach their full potential by tracking the causes of poverty and injustice. World Vision serves the poor and oppressed as a demonstration of God's unconditional love for all people. They provide access to sustainable clean water, food, healthcare, safe living space and education for over 4.1 million children. They responded to 130 humanitarian crises and assisted more than 15.4 million disaster survivors. This organization also assisted more than 12.2 refugees.

February Annual Congregational Meeting Summary- During the Worship Service on Sunday, February 12, 2017, Elder Karen Birtcher was ordained and installed and Rose Gibson and Keith Hare were installed to the office of Elder for the class of 2019.

The annual meeting of the congregation of the First Presbyterian Church, Newark, Ohio convened in Fellowship Hall at 12:15 p.m., Sunday, February 12, 2017. The Rev. Steven B. Brand moderated the meeting

Rev. Brand presented his report stating that the word for 2017 is ENGAGED which means to occupy, attract or involve (someone's interest or attention). We need to be about engagement. We need to seek out ways to allow people to find meaning, use their gifts, build relationships, see positive change and work to the positive change for Newark that we all want.

Clerk Kimberly Dershem presented the following statistical report for 2016:

Congregational Care Team Chair Ann Robinson presented the work of the Deacons that has been transferred to them. Following questions and discussion from the congregation, a motion was made, seconded and carried to change the by-laws

by eliminating section 3.15 entirely, officially closing the Deacon Board.



Treasurer Barbara Jobes reported that the 2016 budget was \$182,852 and the expenses were \$174,490.51. The

treasurer's report included 2016 expenses, the profit/loss statement, specified funds, memorials and line of credit usage. In 2016, 12,352.19 was used from the line of credit.

Barbara Jobes has been elected Treasurer by the Session for 2017.

Personnel Committee Elder Louise Whitis shared that Rev. Brand's financial package for 2017 will remain the same as 2016. A motion was made, seconded and carried to accept the financial package.

A by-law change to the section 3.16 Nominating Committee 3.16 was proposed by Session, seconded and carried as follows:



There shall be a representative Nominating Committee consisting of **five** members. **This committee should be made up of men and women of**

different ages who reflect the diversity of the congregation. These five members include: One Elder from the Session who will serve as Chair of the Committee, One member who will serve as Co-Chair of the Committee, three other members of the congregation and the Pastor, who serves exofficio. (Bold=Wording that changed)

The following names were presented into nomination for the Nominating Committee for 2017: Louise Whitis, Chair; Georgia Porter, Co-Chair; Debbie Blamer; Timothy Detrick; Mary Jo Deweese; Lois Spangler & Rev. Steven Brand, Exofficio.

A motion was made, seconded and carried to close nominations and unanimously elect the above slate.

Budget and Finance Committee Chair Keith Hare thanked James Johnson for serving as chair for nine years. Audits were completed in March for 2015. Audits for May and October of 2016 were also completed.

To meet 2016 expenses, \$10,952.49 of the invested funds was used. However the total amount of invested funds remains greater than it was at the beginning of 2016.

The 2017 budget of \$185,544 was presented. Items of note included that giving for 2016 saw an increase which also increased the mission budget; and the property budget was increased from \$11,000 to \$12,000. A motion was made, seconded and carried to accept the budget as presented.

Christian Education and Scholarship Committee Chair Edward Jobes reported that the scholarship investments are not doing as well as in years past, so they will take on two NARFE Dinners to augment the funds presented in 2017.

ALPHA Course director Peggy Lieb reported that the first course held in the fall had a positive response with an average attendance of 13 and a support team of 15. The program was completely funded by donations.

Church Life Committee Chair Deitera Weekly reported that the committee had taken on the 50-Year Member Recognition from the former Deacon Board. The additions of the Lunch Bunch which meets in restaurants every other month and a Soup Competition were well received.

Evangelism and Outreach Committee Chair Kimberly Dershem reported that budgeted missionaries were again kept at the 2015 level of giving despite a reduction in general budget funding. To maintain the needed total of \$19,211, a withdrawal of \$6,000 was taken from the Mahon Bequest invested funds to cover the years 2015 and 2016.

In addition, the following written annual reports were reviewed and discussed: Church Officers and Staff; Christian Education, Family and Youth; Property; and Worship and Music.

A discussion was held on removal or relocation of memorial items. Rev. Brand reminded all that memorials serve their purpose and this does not take away from the memorial or what the honored have done. Other comments included: Everything in the church is given by someone even without a plaque. Keep the memorial as a memorial and don't worship the object. Make a memory tree with plaques for all donated items on it.

A motion was made, seconded and carried to suspend the ecclesiastical portion of the meeting in order to begin the meeting of the corporation. The clerk declared that a quorum was present. Rev. Brand declared the meeting of the corporation open.

Gary Deweese, 2017 Chair of the Property Committee, was nominated as President of the Corporation. A motion was made, seconded and carried to elect Gary Deweese as President of the Corporation.

A motion was made, seconded and carried to close the meeting of the corporation.

February Session Meeting

Elder Training was given by Treasurer Barbara Jobes regarding procedures for money and checks, invoices and receipts, check requests, monthly and quarterly reporting.

Clerk's Report

A motion was made and approved by email on January 31, 2017 to present the proposed by-law change to the congregation regarding section 3.15 Deacons. The proposal is to eliminate section 3.15 entirely, officially closing the Deacon Board. A motion was made and approved by email on January 31, 2017 to present the proposed by-law change to the congregation regarding section 3.16 Nominating Committee. The proposal states: There shall be a representative Nominating Committee consisting of five members. This committee should be made up of men and women of different ages who reflect the diversity of the congregation. These five members include: One Elder from the Session who will serve as the Chair of the Committee, One member who will serve as Co-Chair of the Committee, three other members of the congregation and the Pastor, who serves ex-officio. A motion was made and approved by email on January 31, 2017 to present the proposed 2017 budget to the congregation for a vote.

Pastor's Report

Following discussion, a motion was made, seconded and carried to use SCRIP funds to purchase 10 new library chairs. Louise Whitis will research 2-3 stores and report in March.

By consensus, Session approved that a list of memorials for the current year will be listed in the annual report.

Church Life Committee reported that there was good attendance at the Lunch Bunch in February.

Congregational Care Team reported that districts have been reduced, rearranged and refocused. New team directories are being prepared.

Evangelism and Outreach Committee reported that the Wilson Gift Card Fundraiser will continue through March. One Great Hour of Sharing begins on Ash Wednesday, March 1.

Personnel Committee reported that all memos of understanding have been signed by staff.

Property Committee reported that 2 new doors have been ordered for those damaged in break-in. The damages were not reported to the insurance company as the costs were less than the deductible of \$1,500.



Worship and Music Committee reported that gluten-free wafers will be available for communion services. Ash Wednesday

service will be on March 1 at 7:00 p.m. in the chapel.

Rev. Brand will lead the first Lenten service at Second Presbyterian on Ash Wednesday at noon followed by lunch prepared by the church members. On Maundy Thursday, April 13, there will be a carry-in dinner at 5:30 p.m. with sandwiches provided. The choir will lead the service in the sanctuary at 6:30 p.m. with the cantata, <u>The</u> Weeping Tree.

Tre Ora Good Friday Services will be held on April 14 from noon to 3:00 p.m. at Christ United Methodist Church.

Hanover Presbyterian has invited the church to attend their Easter Sunrise Service.

Rotary Park has been reserved for the area Presbyterian churches' outdoor service and picnic on September 17.



Budget and Finance Committee stated that reports have been held up as the bank lost the December 25, 2016 deposit until January and the break-in

made it necessary to go through all envelopes and paper work that was disturbed. All reports will be sent by email.

A motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the recommendation of the treasurer to the Budget and Finance Committee for a simplified method of reporting the specified funds.
