Behind the Stained Glass

"So is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it."- Isaiah 55:11

We really didn't get to celebrate Reformation Sunday. The good news is that the bag piper will be back on Veteran's Sunday. The bad news is that we didn't talk about any profound Reformed ideas. So, I just want to talk a little bit about a few ideas about Scripture that gained widespread popularity during the Reformation. The two ideas work together. The first is that it is the responsibility of all individuals to read and interpret Scripture. A huge push within the Reformation is the idea that the Scripture needs to be read by individuals. The Scripture needs to be readable and so it needs to be translated into people's native language. Prior to the Reformation the Scripture was Greek, Latin, Hebrew, and Aramaic. The first English translation was written by John Wycliffe in the 1380s, a little prior to the reformation. To give you an idea of how apposed the Church of the time was to having the Scriptures translated into native languages: Pope Martin the fifth ordered that John Wycliffe's bones be dug up 40 years after his death crushed up and scattered in a river. The church didn't think it was an individual's job to read the Scripture because they did not believe regular folks could understand it and they thought that without the control of the church, individuals would create all sorts of heresy and false interpretations. That leads us to our second idea.

The second idea is called the **perspicuity of Scripture**. The fancy theological word is perspicuity of Scripture but it means that the basic message of Scripture is easily understandable to anyone who reads it. The church said prior to the Reformation that the regular person could not understand the Bible. They could not interpret the Bible themselves, it is just too complicated and so the reading and interpreting of Scripture should be left up to those who have the time and capability to study and fully understand it. The Reformers said no, a regular person can understand Scripture. Yes, there are difficult parts of scripture, yes, there are ideas and references in scripture that go beyond many folks but the core message is understandable to everyone.

Let me give you an example to see how this plays out. Let's look at the parable of the Lost Son in Luke 15. The general idea is that a man has two sons. One of the sons takes his inheritance early, runs off and wastes it all. The other son stays and works for his father. The first son comes back and is met with a celebration. The second son gets mad. The whole thing culminates with the father saying the son who never left: "you are always with me, and everything I have is yours. But we had to celebrate and be glad, because this brother of yours was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found." Now I could take this text a million ways. I can preach this text a million ways. I can talk from the father's perspective, from the perspective of the first son, of the second son. I could dig into thousands of years of commentaries and historical documents. I could look at what every theologian has ever said about this text. I could spend years studying this text and find all sorts of new perspectives and learn nuances of meaning that wouldn't be available to most folks. Yet, what perspicuity of Scripture says is that the core of that message is understandable by all who read it. A man could be handed a Bible by a Gideon, turn to Luke 15, read this passage and understand the basics. There are rewards for those of us who haven't strayed; but God wants even the worst of us to come back to him.

Thanks to a generation of believers that lived 500 years ago, I can read the Bible in my own language. I have been given a gift. God's Word in a language I understand and in a form that I can comprehend. I do not have to learn Greek or Hebrew in order to read God's Word. I do not have to wait for some theologian to explain it to me. I do not have to trust that what a minister is telling me is true, or everything I need to know. That is a magical gift that I hope we are all taking full advantage of.

Main Boiler Replacement



As many of you know, we had to replace the main boiler that heats the Sanctuary, Fellowship Hall and the third floor.

Houston Plumbing was contracted to put in a Burnham Boiler. The boiler is more efficient and is made in Zanesville.

and so also supports a local company.

The full cost estimate for removing the old boiler and installing the new boiler is \$36,950. Houston Plumbing removed the old boiler and has been installing the new boiler. This took longer than expected because more of the existing plumbing and electric needed replaced. However, it is up and running and the church is warm and toasty once again.

In order to get the new boiler installed before the weather cooled off, we used the church's line of credit. To pay off the line of credit, we are requesting additional donations designated for the boiler replacement. So far, we have received approximately **\$15,616 of the \$36,950 needed**. If you would like to make a donation towards this project; put 'Boiler' in the memo line of any checks. Thank you.
