Behind the Stained Glass

(The following is a response I gave to a Facebook post questioning people for thanking God for good things in their lives and not blaming him for the bad, that said one could only believe in science or religion not both, and that said evil proves God as impossible.)

Note that for all but the most fundamental Christian; it is not in fact science vs religion. Instead it is people who believe in nothing beyond the physical universe vs people who think there is more. Science is but a tool we use to understand the physical. We then interpret what science finds in light of our convictions on the reality or non-existence of god. The best example I know is the fact that all things go from order to disorder. Well, the world is in relatively great order and started in disorder, statistically it is impossible for the universe to exist the way it does. So if we believe in god we say God is directing the order. If you do not believe in god, then you go Steven Hawkins route and say that there must be billions and billions of parallel universes, so many that it becomes statistically possible for one or more to be exactly like ours. That is philosophically describing scientific fact in light of one's belief in nothing beyond physical reality, not science.

Now on to the logical discrepancy of praising God for good things without blaming him for the bad. This is a discrepancy caused by people's misunderstanding of Christianity. God promises: forgiveness of sins, a personal relationship, that he hears our prayers, that he knows us in an intimate way, that he will give us his peace, that in faith we can have eternal life, that we can have a transformed life, that we have some level of free will and many other things. He does not promise physical protection. He promised specific groups, individual people, and times of protection; but not as people often believe physical protection, or money, or riches for that matter. It is in fact the opposite. We are warned in the Bible in many locations that following God will lead to physical, mental, and societal persecution. In the end what I am saying is that God performs miracles, he also allows creation to just exist freely within the rules and boundaries he created (that were perverted in the fall) all while redeeming humanity, and creation in the works of Christ Jesus.

Obviously, I cannot solve the problem of evil in a Facebook response. Note however, that creation was perverted in the fall, meaning that things are not how God created them to be. Note that we have free will and many times we choose to sin and sin has way more consequences then we ever realize- wars, murders, starvation, many diseases, ect... are all caused by the sin of one person, or the sins of many. Even natural disasters like hurricanes are far worse because of human sin. The science of global warming is telling us that humans have polluted the earth in such a way that we are going to have more hurricanes, more storms and more severe changes in weather patterns. There have always been natural disasters but the sin of mistreating the earth has caused them to be more devastating and more frequent. Note that evil is real. God is in a real battle with Satan and evil. God will win, but it is a real war none the less. I know people don't like believing in evil; but I think we all have come across something in our lives that is just worse or more sinister then we can blame on humans.


So many of the people who were affected by the most recent storms thanked God for what they did not lose because they could feel God's presence in their lives. I know that this is something impossible to describe to someone who has not felt it; yet it is as real as anything. I have known God's presence in failure, in success, in pain, in loss, in joy. I have seen God's presence at hospitals in the healing of disease but also despite terrific pain and death. To only see God in good is to cheapen the faith and create logical discrepancy that does not exist in the real faith.

Main Boiler Replacement



As many of you know, the main boiler that heats the sanctuary has had a number of issues. Because of the boiler's age, replacement parts were not available. In August, the church received two bids from local companies for replacing the boiler.

Session evaluated the bids and accepted the bid from Houston Plumbing as it has a higher efficiency and slightly lower price. The boiler is made by Burnham Boilers, a company in Zanesville, and so also supports a local source.

The full cost estimate for removing the old boiler and installing the new boiler is \$36,950. The church paid a \$10,000 deposit at the end of August to get the work started.

Houston Plumbing removed the old boiler this past week and the new boiler is set for delivery by October 6th. Installation will take five to ten days so by mid-October we should have heat again.

In order to get the new boiler installed before the weather cools off, we are using the church's line of credit. To pay off the line of credit, we are requesting additional donations designated for the boiler replacement. So far, we have received approximately \$11,000 of the \$36,950 needed.

We are also investigating the possibility of a loan from the Presbytery Investment & Loan Program. This would allow us to spread the payments out over several years. Because the new boiler is more energy efficient than the old boiler, there is a possibility that we can get a "Green Loan" at a lower interest rate. This only makes sense if the interest rate is lower than the earnings on the churches investment fund.

We will keep you updated as the installation proceeds and by mid-October we shouldn't need winter coats in the sanctuary. Put 'Boiler' in the memo line of any checks. Thank you. – Keith Hare





SEPTEMBER SESSION SUMMARY

Clerk's Report - The Presbytery Records Review was completed on Sunday, September 24, 2017 at First Presbyterian Church in Mt. Gilead.

Death- Marcia Louise Fouke on September 5, 2017 with burial at Cedar Hill Cemetery, Newark Wedding- Keegan Hare and Alina Burton on August 6, 2017 at Pataskala Grace Church.

Communion- The Lord's Supper was celebrated during worship on Sunday, September 3, 2017.

Presbytery Business-Letter from Presbytery regarding 2017 per capita of \$33.00 per person for a total of \$4,818. The church will only forward money designated toward per capita by those giving.

Pastor's Report- Hanover Presbyterian Church has invited the youth of First to attend their youth group which meets the first and third Sunday of each month.

Christian Education, Family and Youth
Committee - reported that the adult Sunday School class is studying This Invitational Life by Steven Carter.

Church Life Committee - reported that approximately 145 people from First, Second, Hanover and Woodside Presbyterian Churches met on Sunday, September 17 for worship and a picnic at Rotary Park. The 50-Year Member Recognition and a reception will be on Sunday, October 8, 2017. The Lunch Bunch will meet on October 18 at the Trout Club.

Evangelism and Outreach Committee - reported that the third session of Alpha is currently running through November 16, 2017. A dinner was served to the residents of Candlewick Commons on Thursday, September 14, 2017. The One Great Hour of Sharing collection for 2016 and 2017 has been equally divided and sent to Salvation Army, World Vision and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. A total of \$472.25 was collected for 2017. On Final Fridays the TLC Tent (Talk, Listen and Care) has been available for talk, prayer and cold water. The popcorn cart distributed over 600 bags of popcorn, Christian wristbands and stickers at the Kid's Fest on August 25, 2017.

Property Committee - reported that the new boiler has been ordered and \$11,600.00 has already been donated toward the expense.

The gas meter has been moved from inside the building to the gravel lot.

Worship and Music Committee - reported that Worldwide Communion will be served on Sunday, October 1, 2017. Reformation Sunday will be celebrated with a bagpiper on Sunday, October 29 and All Saints Day on Sunday, November 5 will include a time to remember those who have passed away in the last year.

Budget and Finance Committee - reported that they are researching Presbytery minimum salary for Pastors and reviewing compensation for the custodian. The treasurer reported that July and August reports have been emailed to Session members. The payroll service has increased. A motion was made, seconded and carried to increase the choir director's annual salary to \$4,524, so that it can be divided evenly as this amount is paid over the entire year. The line of credit balance is \$27,822.62 with interest to date of \$246.94. The \$10,000 deposit for the boiler is included in this amount.



1:30-2:30: 'The Church's Role in the Opiate Epidemic' with William Livisay

We know that the church has a role in the Opiate Epidemic. Somehow, we have to be a part of keeping people from drugs, helping those who are addicted to get clean, and reuniting families; but how? William Livisay will be presenting on just how the church can help. Don't expect easy answers or a magic bullet, but there are steps we can take.
